Her 28-year-old daughter Robyn is an environmental engineer, involved in urban planning projects that focus on improving sustainability of the planet.

Husband Jim, with whom she has been married 34 years, is a mechanical engineer in the oil and gas industry. He shares Nancy's passion for helping others in need and in encouraging others to reach their potential for better lives.

Nancy said the tight-knit Chaconas family honors her parents, who believed strongly in their compassionate role in life to focus on "love and service." She reflected, "We are blessed to have so many opportunities and we are grateful to share and find ways to give to others to make the world a kinder and better place."

When Nancy was six years old, she already knew she would become a teacher. Little did she know then how her desire would manifest itself as she reached adulthood. She received her bachelor's degree in Anthropology, then, a teaching certificate, and, finally, a master's in Education. She taught in Fillmore and Santa Paula school districts, everything from Kindergarten through high school. She instructed teachers in Ventura County schools about drug prevention and self-esteem education. She ran adult literacy programs and was a tutoring specialist at the Camarillo Library.


Nancy spent much of her time in her 20s on personal development training. In the 1990s, she worked for a personal development company, but, in 1998, it was purchased by her present business, LegalShield.

Today, Nancy leads LegalShield's training and mentoring programs designed to help others level the legal playing field and take charge of their legal rights. She also created a business called Vision Makers Unlimited, pulling together many of her past experiences and life lessons to empower and inspire women to create their best lives and manifest their dreams through nature, art, and the law of attraction.

Driven by her creativity and being around uplifting people, she is a lifelong student and a relentless pursuer of a life well lived through her contributions to the wellbeing of others. She calls herself an "evolutionary hostess and teacher," sharing her expertise and passion for life with those she mentors and aids.

She is certified as a Law of Attraction Practitioner, Creatively Fit Art Coach, and Irlen Screener for reading and learning disabilities. For nearly 10 years, Nancy studied and co-led workshops and training seminars with Jack Canfield, self-help author of many motivational books, including his "Chicken Soup for the Soul" series.

With everything Nancy has going on, she finds time for gardening, collage designing and painting, hiking and organizing wilderness retreats for women, and helping out monthly at the Somis Food Pantry. She is also a 30-year member of Somis Town and Country, a local service organization focusing on providing college scholarships to area youth.
